Dear Knollwood Families,

We have been studying different kinds of heroes this year. **Personal heroes** are people who demonstrate hero qualities to another person. Examples include family members, close friends, or someone who has touched a person's life in some way. Thank you for returning the unsung heroes request from last week. We will be contacting some of the unsung heroes in the coming weeks.



Instead of a writing assignment that is due back tomorrow, we are asking that each student chose a "**personal hero**" to interview and return the interview by \_\_\_\_\_ may help the student write responses to the interview questions.

We are completing a project of American Unsung Heroes. We have been studying five of the core Native American values with our reading buddies and in social studies. Our students have listened to stories, such as *The Legend of the Bluebonnet* and *Amazing Grace*, and talked about how characters in this story demonstrate these virtues:

- Wawoohola (wah-wo-o-ho-lah): respect- to be considerate, to hold in high esteem.
- Wowacintanka (wo-wah-chin-tan-gah): perseverance- to persist, to strive in spite of difficulties.
- Woohitike (wo-oh-hee-tee-keh): bravery- having or showing courage.
- Canteyuke (chan-te-you-keh): generosity- to give, to share, to have a heart.
- Woksape (wo-ksa-peh): wisdom- to understand what is right and true, to use knowledge wisely.

Please help your child think of someone in their lives who demonstrates one or more of the virtues mentioned above. After selecting an individual, please help your child either interview or research the person. The person can be from the past or the present. Encourage students to find out how the person has practiced one of the values in life and share a short story or example of this experience.

We have included interview questions for your child; however, students may also collect stories, examples, pictures, and/or artifacts. Please help your student record the collected information, stories, and answers to his or her questions. Please return this work by \_\_\_\_\_\_.
